

Earning and spending - Activity plan



Description

A simple card and dice game to encourage learners to work on addition and subtraction of monetary values, using finance records.

Preparation

Ascertain number of groups 2 – 4 learners per group.

Print and cut out the game cards and mark the reverse with the corresponding number (1-5) — one set per group. Shuffle each pile.

Print how to play sheets. Either one per learner or one per group.

Print Personal Finance Records sheet. One per learner.

Place the five piles of cards, face down on the table, in the middle of each group.

Resources

All printable materials provided

Scrap paper (for calculations) Pencils and erasers

One die per group

Vocabulary

Income, expenditure, balance

Introduction/context

Set the context by describing the nature of family finances; the types of income and expenditure, and the importance of keeping track of finances.

Support understanding of the game rules, with examples.

If you want to play a concurrent game over multiple sessions, make a note of the order of learners around the table, so they can pick up where they left off.

Itming 5-50 mins

Gameplay

Allow learners to work through the game, offering support with calculations where required.

ltmtng 5 mins

Pack-down

Ask learners to make a note on their sheets of who last had a turn. Carefully return cards and sheets to your folders to revisit in the future.

Variations/expanding on the activity

Create new cards to expand on the game with more complex calculations, such as larger values or introducing percentages.

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






How to play

In groups of 4 to 6 people, sit in a circle. Place the cards in five piles in the middle of the table.



Each player should have a personal finance record sheet. This is where you will record and work out how much money you have throughout the game.

The first two lines are completed to help you see how to complete the sheet.

Every time you earn some money, put it in the **income** column.

Every time you spend or lose money, put it in the **expenditure** column with a - (minus).

Income means money coming in. Expenditure is money coming out.

- You start the game with a pocket money day and earn £30.00. This has already been added to your sheet.
- Take it in turns to throw the dice. If you throw a 1 to 5, pick up a card of the same number. The card may tell you that you have earned money or won money. The card may tell you that you have spent or lost money.
- Number one and number two cards are different types of expenses.
- Number three and number four cards are different types of income.
- Number five cards are surprises!
- If you roll a six, it is pocket money day and every player gets £30.00!
- One you have rolled the die; the next player can roll, while you add the income or expenditure to yourpersonal finance record sheet.
- When you have added the amount to your sheet, you will need to work out the balance.
 Look at the balance column in the row above. That figure tells you how much money you had before
 you picked your last card. If you have earned more money, you will need to add it to the balance.
 If you have spent or lost money, you will need to take it away from the balance.
 You will then have a new balance.
